



# Creek trail to be asphalt

Safety first — even in the case of a nature park.

That was the final consensus of the city council when it came down to choosing the width and materials for the Putah Creek Nature Park Master Plan called for a 10-foot wide paved trail that includes picnic areas, bench seating and an overlook deck. Eventually planned to have a loop trail, the project compliments the trestle bridge and the future car bridge improvement project, and will provide another unique attraction to Winters.

Earlier this year, the council approved a design project with

bicyclists and other users, while meeting the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations. In addition, the trail must be able to serve maintenance, fire and safety vehicles.

The original Putah Creek Nature Park Master Plan called for a 10-foot wide paved trail that includes picnic areas, bench seating and an overlook deck. Eventually planned to have a loop trail, the project compliments the trestle bridge and the future car bridge improvement project, and will provide another unique attraction to Winters.

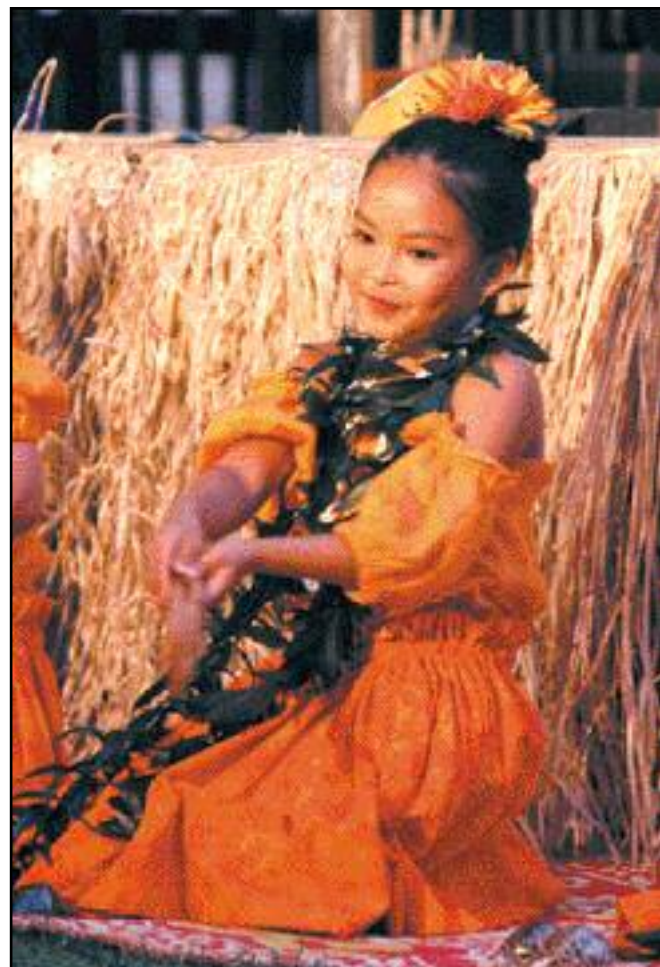
# Aloha means 'Until we meet again'

# Old streets get new surfaces

The city has begun an ambitious paving project throughout Winters, and will be applying various treatments to a third of the city streets in the next few weeks. Of the \$500,000 cost of the project, \$400,000 is funded by Proposition 1B funds and the rest from Transportation Development Act funds.

Parts of Hemenway and Mermod Streets will receive the most serious treatment, including pavement grinding and removal, as well as new pavement and construction of concrete drains and gutters.

This week, Graham Construction of San Jose is applying a chip seal treatment to a number of streets in town, including Russell Street, Walnut Street, Valley Oak Drive and

some of the streets near Valley Oak, east Niemann St., part of Hemenway near Rosa, and portions of streets near Almeria Place and Mermod Place.

Chip seal is finely graded aggregate stone embedded into a thin coating of asphalt. It improves the surface condition of the street, and adds many years to the street's life. Next week

# Winters to get less tax allocations from state

It's one more drop in the budget bucket of woe — a little over \$3,000 that the city of Winters will have to trim from its budget, due to a drop in sales tax collected in town. Winters is on the list of municipalities notified

last week by the California State Board of Equalization (BOE) that their sales tax allocations will be reduced.

The BOE sent 337 letters to local finance directors last week, explaining that declining state sales tax revenues caused a reduction in expected local allocations for their August

2009 advances. In addition, 15 jurisdictions received letters notifying them they will be receiving no August advance.

According to City Manager John Donlevy, this translates into a \$3,300 decrease in sales tax revenue for the City

## Lake Berryessa drops .66 of a foot

The level of Lake Berryessa dropped by .66 of a foot during the past week with a reduction in storage of 10,539 acre feet of water, according to Mickey Faulkner of the Solano Irrigation District.

He reported Tuesday morning that the lake was 410.75 feet above sea level, with storage

computed at 1,041,506 acre feet of water.

The SID is diverting 485 second feet of water into the Putah South Canal and 45 second feet is flowing in Putah Creek at the Diversion Dam.

Evaporation on Lake Berryessa averaged 231 acre feet of water per day during the week.

## County Road 29 closed for widening until September

County Road 29, between County Road 99 and State Route 113, will be closed to traffic until Sept. 18 for reconstruction and widening. After construction, the new road will have two 11-foot wide travel lanes and two new five-foot wide bicycle lanes.

County Road 99D from County Road 29 to the Davis city limit will also be widened to include two 11-foot wide travel lanes and two new five-foot wide bicycle lanes.

This construction will complete the final link of the Davis-Woodland bikeway by providing a 5-foot wide bicycle lane

on each side of the travel lanes between Davis and the Woodland city limit. A detour route will be posted to direct traffic around the closed section.

The existing materials will be recycled in place by "full depth recycling," an environmentally sensitive practice which rebuilds worn out asphalt pavement by recycling 100 percent of the existing roadway.

This method recycles the materials in place, so there is no need to haul in aggregate or haul out old material for disposal.

Callander Associates. Ben Woodside spoke to the council on behalf of Callander Associates, and gave a presentation on the planned trail improvements. He also outlined the different pavement materials.

Woodside explained that asphalt is a soft, durable and easily maintained material, while concrete is nicer, harder and more expensive, and resin, which uses native materials, is difficult to maintain.

Echoing the recommendations of the Putah Creek Nature Park committee, Woodside said, “We recommend asphalt with a 10-foot trail, but we’ll have to listen to you folks.”

Carol Scianna, part of the committee and city staff, said that two meetings were held by the committee, and they came to the consensus that a wider asphalt trail would be best.

“A narrower width provides less heat, runoff and is less intrusive. It’s less money to install and maintain,” Scianna said, adding that patrol could be done by “bike patrol or electric car, reducing greenhouse emissions. The summer soil is so hot that fire trucks could drive on it.”

Giving the council a slideshow that showed pictures of different trail widths and the uses allowed on them, Scianna said that a wider trail provides more uses, and a narrower trail is more prone to damage.

Fire Chief Scott Dozier was asked by City Manager John Donlevy to speak to the council. He said he sees quite a bit of traffic down at the creek, and is troubled that there are no code laws as far as emergency vehicles and nature parks are concerned.

“I’m more concerned about getting ambulances in there. We can live with a 10’ trail, but would like to see a 10’ trail with 1’ wide shoulders,” Dozier said.

Answering a question from Mayor Michael Martin regarding fire access, Dozier said that laying fire hose through people’s backyards to reach the creek causes too much damage, is too time-consuming and takes too much manpower.

Concerned citizens packed the council chambers, eager for their opinions to be heard. Gary Douglas told the council about his experience working in regional, state and national parks, and said that there was nothing really mandating width or materials used,

adding that many trails are not paved.

Jesse Loren urged the city to be conscious of what is used, adding that police should patrol the park, and the city at large, by foot and bicycle, in an effort to be more earth-friendly. She suggested a narrower, meandering path would be best.

Adrienne Perez said that she didn’t think asphalt would be the best material for a nature park, and said that as a homeowner near the creek that “more patrolling is welcome by everyone.”

“A 10-foot wide road wouldn’t do — it would encourage more undesirable uses. I’m in favor of a 6-foot wide path with a 2-foot shoulder and a meandering path,” Perez said.

Umberto Esquerdo agreed, saying he “encourages the council to consider a narrower path with a shoulder... we want people to use it, but have it look nice.”

David Springer, a narrower path advocate, pointed out that a 6’ wide path is double what the ADA requires, and that a narrower path would also save money and allow for a pedestrian bridge to be built at the east end of the creek.

Adding that he is an “advocate for as narrow a path as possible,” Mitch Korcyl asked the council about lighting along the trail. Woodside said that lights would be installed along intersections, and not behind houses.

Finally, Joe Castro presented a different side, saying, “My take is safety and nature. I think we’re building a great thing...I echo the fire chief’s safety concern... it’s more than just fire — it’s medical, too.”

After hearing the public comments, Woodside told the council that the majority of multi-use trails adhere to the local fire department’s recommendations.

“I see why the park committee had such a difficult decision,” said Martin. “Think of the future, of what we want in the community. This is tied to commerce and development — it creates another option for the visitors to downtown.”

“I think we should think big on this,” he continued. “Do it as natural as possible, but ADA acceptable. I personally take into consideration the fire chief’s recommendation. He understands the community. We should make every tool available to the fire department.”

Councilmember Tom Stone agreed, saying that his “primary interest was in getting rescue vehicles down there.”

Donlevy advised the council to let staff know if there were any changes, and give direction on materials and width.

Councilmember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, who came in late to the meeting, said that she was worried about the city’s liability, and that safety should come first.

After more discussion, the council ultimately decided the trail should be 10 feet wide and made of asphalt.

Also, the council, (minus latecomer Aguiar-Curry), unanimously reinstated Joe Tramon-tana to the planning commission, after another applicant stepped down. In addition, the council celebrated Al Vallecillo’s work on the planning commission, presenting him with a plaque commemorating his service.

“You’ve gone through some really tough years,” said Martin, to which Vallecillo replied, “Yeah, I’ll say.”

Donlevy added that Vallecillo was “always very sincere.”

“He represents so many of the great things about the community,” said Donlevy.

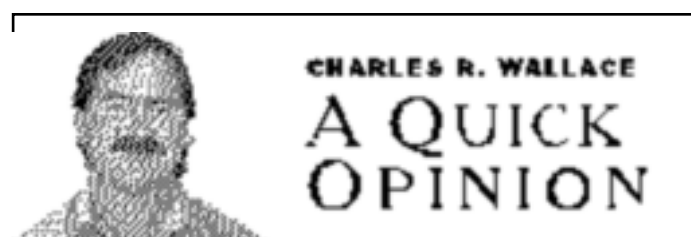
I'm envisioning a 1950s-esqe Lovers Lane of sorts... tandem

## Creek restoration begins

Putah Creek is about to begin a dramatic environmental restoration which has been years in the planning. The process will include four major projects and a considerable amount of work within the reaches of the creek. The project began with a clearing operation on the abandoned sewer ponds and will inevitably include projects which will stretch both east and west of the Railroad Trestle Bridge.

The overall project is a huge partnership. The City of Winters is proud to have partnered with the Solano County Water Agency, Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee, Winters Putah Creek Committee, Putah Creek Council, Army Corps of Engineers, State Fish and Game, National Fish and Wildlife Service, Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board, Rivers Parkways Grant Program, State Department of Resources and Audubon California in making

of Winters, which isn't a huge amount in the short term, but will add up if the allocations continue to decline every quarter. Donlevy said the decrease isn't enough to cause any alarm at the moment.

"In our budget, we'll have to make adjustments, which we do at mid-year," said Donlevy. "In this case, for \$3,000, we aren't going to redo our budget over that, but will note it accordingly."

The press release issued by the BOE states that the adjusted allocations are a continuation of the unprecedented drop-off in taxable sales due to the recession over the last year, and that payments to local taxing jurisdictions are based in part on prior taxable sales patterns that do not apply in the current economic climate. Similar letters were sent to 473 local jurisdictions in May 2009.

The state's Department of Finance estimated that payments to

local governments for the second quarter of 2009 were reduced by 14.4 percent. An analysis of actual cash receipts from the second quarter of 2009 showed an overall decline of 18.74 percent, not taking into account the newly imposed 1 percent sales tax increase going directly to the state. To account for the further decline, an additional adjustment of -4 percent was applied to jurisdictions that saw a decline in revenues greater than 21.4 percent.

According to Shelly Gunby, director of financial management for the City of Winters, sales tax for the second quarter declined from \$68,999 in 2008 to \$55,978 in 2009, which represents an 18.9 percent decline. Just like elsewhere in the state and across the country, people are spending less money, which translates to less sales tax revenue in their communities.

Donlevy reminds local residents that when they have money to spend, spending it in here in town really makes a difference for

the city's budget.

"The reduction in sales tax is linked to two main issues. First, our primary source of sales tax is from gasoline, which has gone down significantly in price. Second, local spending is way down, especially for hardware and more durable goods.

"If residents would simply shop at the local hardware stores and eat one meal a month in downtown, it will make a huge difference in city revenues."

From sales tax figures, the BOE makes monthly allocations to 768 local jurisdictions based on a formula that includes historical allocations, growth factor adjustments to the base, transfers and audits, and actual cash receipts. According to the BOE press release, erosion in the expected cash receipts led to the downward monthly adjustments to the allocations for August 2009.

Not all local jurisdictions received an August 2009 allocation with an additional reduction, though almost half of the 768 total ju-

risdictions did. This is fewer than received additional reductions in May, but BOE anticipates similar adjustments will occur to the third and fourth quarter 2009 advances as well.

In addition to the monthly allocation adjustments in August and in May, similar adjustments were made in February based on fourth quarter 2008 information. Prior to 2009, broad scale reductions statewide had not occurred.

The five-member California State Board of Equalization is a publicly elected tax board. The BOE collects more than \$53 billion annually in taxes and fees supporting state and local government services. It hears business tax appeals, acts as the appellate body for franchise and personal income tax appeals, and serves a significant role in the assessment and administration of property taxes.

the environmental dreams of so many become a reality. This has included extensive preparation and permitting through national and state agencies.

In preparation for what is planned to be one of the most impressive riparian restoration projects in Yolo or Solano County, contractors will soon begin the delicate process of extracting the old concrete percolation dam. It may look a little messy for a few months, but when the project is completed, the area will be reseeded with native grasses and eventually replanted with larger native riparian species.

The necessary permits and processing are almost completed and the most extensive work of the initial project is imminent. The period of work will span the next three months. Most of the first phases of work will conclude in November. During this period, sections of the creek may be closed during the construction activity for safety purposes.

The project is one of the earliest forays into implementing the Winters Putah Creek Master Plan; a document created from all of the insightful proposals contributed by Winters residents. When construction begins it will kick off multi-year project(s) that include stream

restoration, bike and walking trails, increased access to the creek, and with luck (and funding), a second pedestrian bridge to eventually complete a dynamic loop trail for evening strolls before or after a wonderful downtown meal. The dream of the Winters Putah Creek Committee, City Council and city staff is to increase both human and wildlife use of the park area, and to one day witness salmon and steelhead spawning in this reach of the creek.

The project is significant and residents and visitors will see considerable amounts of work. This will include land movement and the creation of flood plains, removal of exotic and non-native plants and trees, the development of rock weirs within the creek, the de-watering and realignment of the creek and the most extensive native plant and floral restoration ever initiated on Putah Creek.

The city and its partners will plan a job walk and briefing within the next few weeks. This will allow the press and public an opportunity to gain insight into the project as it is occurring.

Until the project is under way, no additional briefings are planned, except for updates before the City Council and Winters Putah Creek Committee.

and the week after, the contractors will apply slurry seal to many more streets, as well as to the streets receiving chip seal this week.

Slurry seal is a coating of asphalt that renews the street surface, and gives the streets a renewed black color.

The contractor has posted notices at homes along the paving routes that show street closure schedules. Streets will be closing off in a staggered pattern during the paving job, and homeowners must plan where to park and how to drive in and out, while routes are closed.

The maps are posted

on the city web site at <http://cityofwinters.org>.

During the slurry seal application, streets will be closed from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The slurry coat is a gooey mess at first, and driving on a closed-off portion during the slurry seal operation can severely damage cars.

City Environmental Services Manager Carol Scianna notes that green waste can interfere with the paving job.

“People on streets being paved on Monday to Wednesday need to wait until Thursday to put out their clippings,” said Scianna. “People getting the seal coat on Thursday or Friday will have to not put anything out until the following week.”

## School board discusses declining enrollment

In his trustee report at the August 20 school board meeting, trustee Jay Shepherd reported on discussions at a workshop put on by California School Services. "They did make comment about districts that have been in declining enrollment," said Shepherd. "They have gained an expertise in making cuts. That's the only good thing you can say about declining enrollment — we're familiar with the process and we know that when it has to be done it's got to be done. We have a little advan-

tage over districts that are just now facing the realities of cuts for the first time." Shepherd also discussed a problem urban districts are facing as their enrollment stops declining and starts increasing. One boost for districts like Winters that have seen constant declining enrollment over many years is the option the district has to use the population count from the previous year to calculate funding for the current year, effectively increasing funding per student. This becomes a problem when the curve turns the other way. "There's that perfect

storm," said Shepherd, "when you start to grow again, where you have more kids, and you're funded with less money. What's happening now, in several of the urban districts, is people that are losing their suburban homes are moving in with the grandparents. We all want for the curve to start back up again, but the first years it will be painful. Teacher and frequent commenter Dave Paratore spoke on the work of Pam Scheeline and Sandra Ayon, principal and assistant principal at the Middle School, who now direct Shirley Rominger Intermediate School as

well. "As you know," said Paratore, "our principal is gone, and we have two principals now, and Pam and Sandra are doing a really great job — they're working their ends off. You can see they're tired, but it's been working great. They deserve a lot of credit." "But?" asked Shepherd, awaiting criticism. "No but," said Paratore, to laughter. The next school board meeting will take place at 6:30 p.m., at the district office, 911 Grant Ave., on Thursday, Sept. 3.

## Asthma can appear at any age

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 47, and my doctor tells me I have asthma. Is that possible? I thought it was a children's disease. One of the medicines the doctor put me on is a cortisone-type inhaler. This has me scared silly. I don't want to stay on a cortisone medicine for life. I have heard it does too many bad things. What do you have to say about this? — M.L.

ANSWER: Asthma can make an appearance at any age. The incidence of it peaks between the ages of 4 and 10, and again in the 40s. It's not only a childhood illness.

During an asthma attack, the airways (bronchi) narrow because the muscles wrapped around them go into spasm. That makes it hard for air to get into and out of the lungs. Added to the airway constriction is an outpouring of thick mucus within the airways, another obstruction to the flow of air through these passages.

For an acute asthma attack, medicines that relax the muscles wrapped around the airways are used, most often delivered via an inhaler. The onset of action of these medicines is quick, but their duration is only about four to six hours. So it is also important to administer to asthmatics medicines that last longer.

Inhaled cortisone medicines are such drugs, and they're essential for asthma control. They soothe irritated airways and prevent the contraction of airway muscles. They also prevent the production of thick mucus. It can take up to four weeks before the effect of these medicines is appreciated.

Inhaled cortisone doesn't cause the serious side effects that prolonged use of oral and injectable cortisone can. Your health isn't going to be in danger from its use. Your health is going to improve with its use. You might not have to use it for life.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Enclosed is an ad for vitamin B-4. Is it as good as the ad says? — L.F.

ANSWER: Sometime in the past, scientists thought there was a vitamin B-4 whose lack was responsible for slow growth in animals. It was called adenine. Adenine is real, but it's not a vitamin. It's the building material for DNA and RNA. It's found in many foods. You don't need a supplement of it. \*\*\*

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: When my 68-year-old husband exercises, he smells like rotten onions. He claims that deodorants and antiperspirants are harmful. He says you need to let your armpits breathe. I say he's wrong. — Anon.

ANSWER: Many people believe that deodorants and antiperspirants are harmful. I'm not one of them. Armpits don't breathe. The lungs do.

Your husband can wash under the arms before and after exercising. Skin bacteria cause the odor, not sweating. \*\*\*

## VETERANS POST

### The New GI Bill

The newest version of the veterans' education program, called the Post-9/11 GI Bill, is now up and running. The package of benefits is better than ever. If you've thought about going back to school or getting training, this could be the time.

To qualify, a veteran must have at least 90 days of service on or after Sept. 11, 2001, and an honorable discharge. Those with service-connected disabilities only need 30 days of service. The percentage of benefits you receive depends on the time you served after that date. Three years gets you the maximum benefit.

The new program covers:

- Tuition and school fees paid directly to the school (the amount is capped at the level of maximum in-state tuition).
- Up to \$1,000 for books.
- A housing allowance with the amount dependent on the cost of living where you live.

Not all training is covered under the new program. For example, flight training and entrepreneurship training are not covered unless they're being given at one of the authorized Institutions of Higher Learning.

Your first stop should be the Department of Veterans Affairs site: <http://www.gibill.va.gov>. There you'll find links to a list of the in-state maximum tuition and fees by states, the housing allowance by ZIP code, as well as a page of benefit comparisons between the new Post-9/11 program and the old Montgomery program, which is still operating.

Your most difficult decision might be which program to go with — Post-9/11 or Montgomery. With the latter, you'd receive a set monthly payment that has nothing to do with your actual expenses. Take pencil and paper to the numbers and see which works best for you.

Once you decide, it's never too early to apply and get the paperwork started. You can apply online or have the forms sent to you by calling 1-888-GI BILL-1 (1-888-442-4551).
